[Families and Food in Hard Times](#) - Rebecca O'Connell 2021-05-24

Food is fundamental to health and social participation, yet food poverty has increased in the global North. Adopting a realist ontology and taking a comparative case approach, *Families and Food in Hard Times* addresses the global problem of economic retrenchment and how those most affected are those with the least resources. Based on research carried out with low-income families with children aged 11-15, this timely book examines food poverty in the UK, Portugal and Norway in the decade following the 2008 financial crisis. It examines the resources to which families have access in relation to public policies, local institutions and kinship and friendship networks, and how they intersect. Through 'thick description' of families' everyday lives, it explores the ways in which low income impacts upon practices of household food provisioning, the types of formal and informal support on which families draw to get by, the provision and role of school meals in children's lives, and the constraints upon families' social participation involving food. Providing extensive and intensive knowledge concerning the conditions and experiences of low-income parents as they endeavour to feed their families, as well as children's perspectives of food and eating in the context of low income, the book also draws on the European social science literature on food and families to shed light on the causes and consequences of food poverty in austerity Europe.

[Work and Unemployment 1834-1911](#) - Marjorie Levine-Clark 2022-06-17

This volume includes primary sources that identify "The Long History Toil," which demonstrate that vagrancy and idleness went against constructions of the English, then British, character. While the state as early as Tudor times made provision to assist unemployed persons, in order to receive assistance, the unemployed (and particularly men) had to physically labor for that help. The section "Work, Class, and Identity," continues this theme with different types of sources, examining some classic texts that defined the meanings of work for Victorians, such as Thomas Carlyle's essay where he talks about the "Gospel of Work," and Samuel Smiles's "Self Help." The section will also include some more obscure writings that explain how poor people thought about work in comparison to these more elite texts. The first two sections in this volume firmly establish the work imperative as fundamental to understandings of work and unemployment. "Men's Work and Women's Work" will explore the gendered nature of work and the ways the moral considerations attached to work applied differently to men and women. Women, because their primary role in the era was reproductive, had a different relationship to paid employment. Unpaid employment in the home was also expected of women in ways that it was not for men, and paid employment was never core to feminine identity for women like it was to masculine identity for men.

[Being an Adult Learner in Austere Times](#) - Ellen Boeren 2018-12-17

This book examines the experiences of adult learners in times of austerity. The power of adult education to transform lives is well known, and it is especially powerful for those who missed out on educational opportunities earlier in life. Those who have been successful learners in the past are more likely to continue their education and training, making extra support and funding ever-more important: however, in the current economic and political climate, support for adult learning is significantly decreasing. This book sheds light on the experiences of adult learners, despite the difficulties facing the sector: interweaving empirical discussions with theoretical debates, the editors and contributors demonstrate the challenges and struggles of adult learners in higher, further and community education. This enlightening edited collection will be of interest to all those involved in adult education as well as policy makers and funders.

Taking a critical and radical approach, this book calls for a return to mental health social work that has personal relationships and an emotional connection between workers and those experiencing distress at its core. Neoliberalism has added stress to services already under great pressure and created a danger that we could revert to institutional forms of care. This thought-provoking monograph provides a systematic, philosophically-grounded reconceptualisation of press freedom and press regulation. In a major departure from orthodox norms, the book argues that press freedom and coercive independent press regulation are not mutually exclusive; that newspapers could be made to compensate their victims, through regulation, without jeopardising their free speech rights; that their perceived public watchdog status does not exempt them; and, ultimately, that mandatory press regulation is not unconstitutional. In doing so, the book questions our most deeply-held, intuitive beliefs about the press and its role in society. Why do we say the printed press has a duty to act as a public watchdog when there is no legally enforceable apparatus by which to ensure it does? Why does government constantly recommend that the press regulate itself when history shows this model always fails? Why do victims of press malfeasance continue to suffer needlessly? By deconstructing the accepted view of press freedom and mandatory regulation, this book shows that both are deeply misunderstood. The prevailing notion that the press must serve the public is an empty relic of Victorian ideology that is both philosophically incoherent and legally unjustifiable. The press is obliged to make good, not do good.

Despite the fraught topic and the ongoing legal discussions, the subject has not received much scholarly attention until now. The essays examine the confiscatory taxation of Jewish property, the looting of art and confiscation of gold, the role of German freight forwarders in property theft, salesmen and dispossession in the retail world, theft from the elderly, and the complicity of the banking industry, as well as the reach of the practice beyond German borders.
